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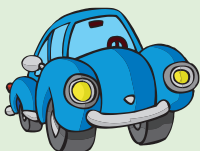

The Vicar Writes



Dear Friends

Why is it always snowing in the adverts on telly at this time of year?

Every year a newspaper or television programme tries to debunk the Christmas story. In fact they are debunking what they think is the Christmas story rather than what is actually in the Bible. Read Matthew and Luke's Gospels for what really happened. You may be surprised!

The real Christmas Myth is the one you see in newspapers and on television commercials night after night, presenting the happy picture of doting parents and satisfied children enjoying a completely stress-free celebration. The real family life that is at the heart of the real Christmas story is radically different.

Mary is a teenage mum, pregnant outside marriage. She is almost abandoned and then wonderfully supported by her husband-to-be. About to give birth, they are forced to travel great distances to conform to the tax regulations of an occupying foreign power. There is nowhere for the child to be born, so Mary ends up giving birth in a cowshed at the back of a pub. There was no midwife. No gas and air. No clean sheets. No epidural.

The Christmas story we find in the Bible is much closer to most people's lives than the cosy families in the commercials. Real people struggle with enormous challenges and support each other through enormous difficulties.

It is odd that the Christmas story is all about God coming to earth to show us how to live, to show us what being human should really look like, yet so often we respond by spending too much money, running up yet more debts and eating far more than is good for us.

Yet we usually put a star or an angel on top of the Christmas tree, even in the homes of people who aren't planning any visits to church or who aren't reading this letter. And the star and the angel take us right back to the heart of the story and the strange announcement to Mary that she will bear God's son, a new star offering the world a different path to follow.

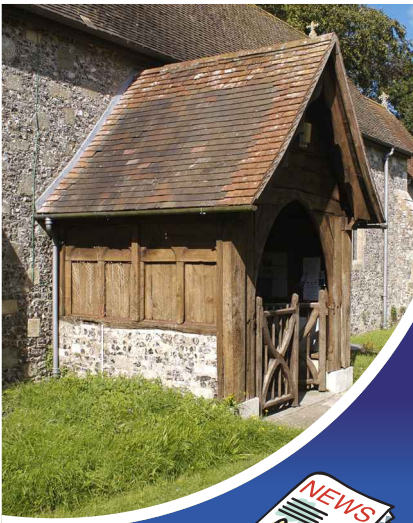
So this year, rather than pretending to be like those impossible people we see on TV, perhaps we should just think about how we can show our families, with all their oddities, frustrations, challenges and delights that we love them. Perhaps we should decide that we love them! Give them your love - as God gave his - as the best Christmas present ever.

I have based this month's letter on a lovely little book called 'Do Nothing, Christmas is Coming' by Stephen Cottrell. It is a great Advent read.

Christmas is often the time when families get together, but also often the time when they fall apart. So think through what members of your family are facing, and pour some goodwill onto them. Pray for them. Share with them.

Permission to start work

We have now received permission to carry out the first stage of our plans and are almost ready to begin our improvements to St

Mary's. We shall restore and move the font from its present position in the tower (where it was moved by our Victorian forbears) to a better position and create a good social area around it. We can then lower the floor in the base of the tower and use the space for a toilet cubicle and extra storage behind smart opaque glass doors. We aim to start this work after Christmas, and then think about improving the welcome area, the sound and lighting, and the kitchen area. We believe this will make the church an even greater resource for the village.

We still need to do a lot of fund raising for this exciting project, so if you would like to know more or contribute in any way please talk to the vicar or church wardens.

Love in a Gift Box

Have you finished all your Christmas shopping? Christmas starts sometime around October nowadays, and it doesn't really finish until April 5th of the following year, when we realise just how much we spent!

Giving and receiving presents is a wonderful part of the Christmas. And we know that the tradition of giving presents at Christmas started with the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus, but there are many other examples of present giving in the Bible as well.

Mark tells us that *'a woman came with an alabaster jar of very expensive perfume... she broke the jar and poured the perfume on Jesus'* head. Some of those present were saying indignantly to one another *"Why this waste of perfume? It could have been sold... and the money given to the poor."* And they rebuked her harshly. *"Leave her alone,"* said Jesus... *"She has done a beautiful thing... She did what she could. She poured perfume on my body beforehand to prepare for my burial. I tell you... wherever the gospel is preached throughout the world, what she has done will also be told, in memory of her."* (Mark 14:3-9).

Joseph of Arimathea brought a hundred pounds of ointment to embalm Jesus after he was dead, and not a word of praise is spoken about it in all Scripture. The woman brought just one pound of ointment and poured it on him while he was still living, and Jesus praised her and pointed out two things:

- 1) 'She did what she could.'

Acts of kindness are usually not about doing great things, but about doing small things with great love.

- 2) 'What she has done will also be told, in memory of her.'

What will you be remembered for – a life of service or a life of self-centredness?

Giving gifts should be about wanting good for the other person. If you want good for someone, tell them. Go out of your way to fill their lives with joy while there is still time. Those expressions of appreciation and love, those words of forgiveness, that special gift you've had in mind, give it while you can. Don't keep your love in a box.

The problem is that so often we spend money we can't afford on presents nobody really wants. So how about showing someone you love them by NOT spending money? Make them a jar of marmalade or a box of sweets. Run them a hot bath. Give them a present that will help someone else - Christian Aid has a great range of presents, from goats to cans of worms, from school desks to latrines. Give the student going to university a stack of envelopes and stamps. Whatever you do, tell them and show them you love them. Don't keep you love in a box.

The Wise Men brought Jesus gifts in a box. With gold for kingship, frankincense for worship and myrrh for death, they were gifts that pointed to where the story would lead. The authorities tried to put Jesus himself in a box on Good



Friday, when he challenged their way of living. But the love of God cannot be contained. It is with us today; Immanuel, God with Us. Be generous. Love a lot. Give yourself.
