Electrical work to begin at Gussage St Andrew's

Whilst we draw breath at St Mary's, the hard work continues at St Andrew's Chapel.

The paperwork and funding for the electrical



work is falling into place and quotes for the work have been approved by the PCC. Work is expected to start by the end of the year which will involve rewiring the chapel and replacing the heating and lighting systems. The aim is to protect the delicate mediaeval wall paintings and keep the congregation warm when needed! The new lighting will be easier to use and will provide safer levels of light where needed.

In October, St Mary's as a Church will give £200 to The Mission to Seafarers (www.missiontoseafarers.org). This is a missionary society within the Anglican Church caring for the spiritual and practical welfare of seafarers regardless of nationality or faith. Through its network of chaplains, staff and volunteers in 230 ports, they visit ships, offering a welcome and whatever help may be needed. In over 100 ports they run centres where (often desperate) seafarers can get local information, find help and share worship and contact home.

Then in November we shall give to The Royal British Legion (www.britishlegion.org.uk) which provides financial, social and economic support for millions of people who have served or are currently serving in the armed forces, and their dependants.



I'm sure many of us have enjoyed the three 'Toy Story' films over the years. One of my favourite characters in the stories is Mr Potato Head. A little girl was learning the Lord's Prayer. For several evenings at bedtime, she would repeat after her mother the lines one by one. Finally, she decided to say the whole thing by herself. Her mother listened with pride as she carefully spoke each word, right up to the end: "Lead us not into temptation," she prayed, "but deliver us some e-mail. Amen."

If you read the Lord's Prayer carefully, it is not an easy prayer to say and really mean. It makes demands of us, and reminds us that prayer is not just about asking for the things we want – there are difficult things that we have to pray and do as well.

The Lord's Prayer stays the same, of course, but how we pray it has changed. I remember the fuss many years ago when 'which art in heaven' was changed to 'who art in heaven.' But the version we use is only a translation. It was originally written in Greek, and Jesus probably spoke it in Aramaic. So how about a really modern version?

I'm sure most of you have mobile phones, and if you do you probably send texts. And recently there was a competition to write the Lord's Prayer in text. Talk about modern translations! You may know that the longest a text message can be is 160 characters. The traditional version of the Lord's Prayer is 372 characters long, so you have to be creative and cut the prayer down by more than half without losing the meaning.

The Lord's Prayer comes in the Bible as a direct answer to the request from the disciples for guidance on how to pray. And Jesus clearly intends prayer to be a living thing, a thing about relationship. That is why we can have the Lord's Prayer in text and we can pray wherever and whenever we want: Prayer is not about the exact words we use or how we stand or sit or kneel. It is about our relationship with God.

Jesus tells us to call God 'Our Father.' And it reminds us that we are part of a very big family indeed. If God is my father and your father, then we are part of the same family, part of a family that stretches over the whole world. The bottom line is that prayer is a conversation between the child and the father. The Perfect Father who delights in spending time in conversation with his children. Our Father.

And a conversation can be about the little things just as well as the big things in life. We can talk about whatever is in our heads or on our hearts. And this is a conversation that has a result. We pray 'Your kingdom come, Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.' That is a big prayer.

Let's pray together and make it happen. Amen.
