Greetings from Baghdad

The Rev Canon Andrew White, the 'vicar of Baghdad' writes; I am pleased to be back with my church, but being here is very sad. People are so very frightened. Frightened for their lives. Many simply just want to flee. They can't see how any sort of future is possible in Baghdad. In the last few weeks many have left St. George's Church - perhaps up to 500 people. A large proportion of these have gone to Syria, where there is an Anglican church.

Some very serious prayer requests;

1. Security. There are threats from Al Qaida to attack and kill more Christians - myself in particular. So please pray for our protection.

2. For the immense fear of the Christians. All are so afraid; they need a sense of Divine protection, their fear removed and for the Angels of our Lord to protect them.

Yesterday I spoke on Romans 8:18: 'I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us.' The question from the young people on Friday was simply, "Why has all this happened to us, why has God not stopped it?" There are not simple answers to these questions but this passage on suffering and glory is the nearest thing we have to an answer. We really do suffer with Christ and we really do see his glory. He will sustain us and help us through any difficulties because we know that "that the Lord as here and His Spirit is with us".

On Sunday afternoon we have our major service of the week. We did not even know if people would turn up after the threats to attack Christians again in Church. We were about 200 down but at least 300 were present. I preached and then listened to what the people had to say. The resounding message was that people would not be threatened or scared by what had been said to them because Jesus was still with them. They were not happy with those who said that Iraqi Christians should leave Iraq. So despite the terrible things that have happened there will be some who'll not leave - and we do not want them to. As I said to them again today, even though I do not have to be here and despite knowing the danger, I will not leave. Your prayer would be much appreciated.

On Christmas Day itself there are two services; a Family Communion at Sixpenny Handley at 9.30 and then another Communion at Pentridge at 11.15. Come along and remind yourself of the reason for the season.

Margaret Owen in Turkey...

Margaret, who lives in Pentridge, has sent us the press statement from the UK Delegation observing the trial of 151 Kurdish political activists and human rights defenders in Turkey. She was there as a Barrister and Human Rights Activist as part of the UK Delegation of Mr. Jeremy Corbin MP, Mr. Hywel Williams MP, Mr. Ali Has Lawyer/Spokes person of Peace Council Britain, Mr. Hugo Charlton Barrister, and Serife Semsedini – Human Rights Activist, along with delegations from other European countries.

'Turkey, in its desire and aspiration to become a member of the European Union has not shown that it has progressed very much in terms of its treatment and approach to the Kurdish people. We find that these trials are politically motivated and are an attempt to suppress the political struggle of the Kurdish people through the judicial system.

The manner in which the evidence in the trials is exaggerated is clear from the sheer volume of the 7,500 page indictment and supporting evidence, consisting of over 13,000,000 pages. In these pages there is no evidence of weapons or aggression in any kind directed at any of the defendants who stand trial. The only evidence obtained consists of intercept evidence of daily conversations and routine political propaganda or views and secret evidence by way of anonymous witnesses. The fact that there is no evidence or suggestion of weaponry or aggression is in our view indicative of the will of the Kurdish people and politicians for a peaceful solution to the Kurdish issue, which we support and respect.

The real problem with this is that the charge is essentially a political one, whereby normal political activities are deemed to be criminal because it is said to be in support of a banned organisation, the PKK. Clearly, by any standards, activities such as those mentioned are completely lawful and innocent. We have particular concern that 8 of the defendants are lawyers – 7 of which are in custody – and are indicted in this case simply for doing their job of defending their clients. In a modern society this is unacceptable.

At the very least, the fact that most of those in prison are leading members of a political party which had been successful at the last elections suggests that there is a straightforward electoral motive for the Turkish governing party to support these prosecutions particularly as there is another election next year. If the Turkish government wishes to demonstrate that Turkey is a modern and democratic state it should urge the prosecution to release those in prison immediately.'

Since this Press Release arrived, Jeremy Corbyn MP has tables an Early Day Motion in Parliament including a call on Turkey 'to end its criminalisation of Kurdish political activism and to begin a comprehensive conflict resolution process involving all relevant Kurdish political actors.'


Think & Do is working to improve literacy in rural Egypt. They would appreciate your prayers for the women who attend the classes, that they will find confidence and knowledge that will help them improve their own lives and those of their families. Please also pray for the staff, without whose commitment and energy the work would not be possible.



Do you feel advertising targets children and puts them and you under pressure to buy age-inappropriate gifts? Do you feel sexualised and violent computer games and films are too easily available? Do you find TV, the internet and music have made your children more sexually aware? Do you feel out of control over your child's social networking on the computer?

A survey by Mothers' Union found 80% of parents were very concerned about these issues, including our Prime Minister! Bye Buy Childhood is a campaign launched by Mothers Union to raise awareness and support parents in their role and to lobby the advertising industry.

Chief Executive Reg Bailey said "We are most concerned about the inappropriate sexualisation of children and the insidious way it has happened under the noses of parents. We want to give parents more confidence, as well as encourage advertisers to be responsible. We are not calling for new legislation, but we want the current codes of practice enforced. We don't sentimentalise childhood – we've all been subject to peer pressure – but it's the sheer volume of it today that is worrying. There is more and more pressure on children to assess themselves and it is diminishing their sense of belonging and meaning in their lives. 
Men's Group – A beer and a chat usually on the last Thursday of the month. Phone David Lockyer for details (552492).
