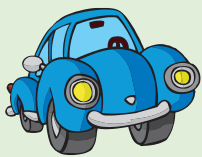

How do you S.H.A.P.E. up?

As autumn gets into its stride, now is the time to think about our SHAPE. I am not talking about over-indulging in apple and blackberry crumble and custard, but something much more important. I am talking about our God-given SHAPE. The SHAPE God wants you to be. SHAPE stands for;



We each have a different SHAPE. There is no one-size-fits-all with God. We are all different and our job is to become truly ourselves and no one else. As St Paul says, *for just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us.* (Romans 12)

Yet so many of us just aren't aware of what our shape is, and as a result are frustrated, because we feel we aren't doing anything worthwhile with our lives, or we are struggling with a job or a role that doesn't really fit. And also, just as *physical* shape changes (a bit) as we grow older, so our *spiritual* shape changes over time — it may be different now to how it was only a few years ago.

And I need to add that our SHAPE is *not* about filling jobs in the Church — it is not about filling the blanks on the 'to do' list, although I believe that God will ensure that that happens, that we have everything we need. It is about finding the rounded and whole person we are meant to be, focusing on what and where God has made you to be and how he has shaped you to serve.

This is all part of being part of the Kingdom of God. As we ponder our SHAPES, we will find we know a lot about ourselves — probably more than we realized until we start thinking about it.

And as we all think through and discern our Spiritual Gifts, our Heart, Abilities, Personality and Experience, God will work through us to grow his church — and we will be further on in becoming the people He means us to be.

So, let's think more about our SHAPE.

S stands for *Spiritual gifts*.

In 1 Corinthians 12 Paul says, *there are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. 5 There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work.*

We all have at least one spiritual gift — what is yours? Now, we are a modest bunch and it can be difficult to say what our Spiritual gift is. It is sometimes easier to say what someone else's gift is. So, perhaps you can tell someone... if they are particularly perceptive, spiritually insightful, or someone is an amazing encourager, or pray-er, or teacher, or giver... Tell them.

H is easier — it stands for *Heart*.

Where is your heart? What really fires you up? Perhaps your heart leaps when you think of helping people, of helping young parents with toddlers, or caring for those who cannot get out of their homes anymore through age or infirmity, or maybe it is gardening, or cooking... What fires you up? What is on your heart?

A stands for *abilities*.

We need to be honest and realistic about our abilities. Perhaps you are a whizz with mathematics. Perhaps you are a natural born cook. Perhaps you have a talent in music. This is not a time to be falsely modest — or to boast. Abilities are sometimes called 'natural gifts': They are a combination of what you have learnt and what you are naturally good at. And we are all naturally good at, at least one thing.

P stands for *personality*.

What do you naturally tend towards? Are you patient, imaginative, good at seeing the details, caring, energetic...? You may be very patient, or naturally inclined to prayer, or there is nothing that pleases you more than a page of sums, or the challenge of cleaning... Know your own personality and you are half way there!

E stands for *Experience*.

Where do you come from? What experience do you have? We have all picked up all sorts of knowledge, tips, tricks of the trade over the years and along the way. And we can use that experience in God's service if we choose.



Dear Friends

There has been a lot of talk of the tenth anniversary of the terrible attacks on the Twin Towers in New York. 'A good day to bury bad news' was how a Labour spin-doctor famously and foolishly described 9/11. Looking at how the media deal with death can be a mystifying experience.

Over the summer, for instance, much airtime and many column inches of report, homage and comment have been given to the death of musician Amy Winehouse. Newspapers and TV reports have been full of the tragic killings in Norway. Less attention has been given to the fate of millions of people in East Africa, where there has been the worst famine in 60 years. Mothers in search of food are leaving their sick children in the desert to die.

So why does the death of a 27-year-old singer in England get a bigger media response than the deaths of thousands in Africa?

Perhaps it is the scale. We can picture one, but thousands are too mind-boggling for us to take in. Perhaps our lives are too different. In our society of overflowing plenty we can have little concept of going without to such an extent that it kills us. It is easier to identify with someone who has overindulged.

Perhaps we have become immune, inured to death on such a cataclysmic scale. No longer shocked by images of pot-bellied children covered in flies, we flick to a cookery programme without a second thought and shrug it off as 'yet another African famine.'

Death is inevitable. The circumstances are not. Those who eat or drink themselves into an early grave have a measure of choice in their actions. Those who can't remember the last time they had even a half-full stomach have no control over their circumstances or fate.

One death in Somalia is just as tragic as one death in England. If we ever lose sight of that fact, something inside us will have died. And that will not be a good day.

St Mary's Churchyard

You will know that the churchyard at St Mary's, Sixpenny Handley, is running short of space and that for some years there has been talk of using the extension area, between the bottom of the current churchyard and the recreation ground. Through a very generous donation by Richard Adlem we are now in a position to begin work on this area.

Our plan for this area falls into two phases; the first is to clear the scrub that has grown up, including pulling out all the roots. The second phase is to spread the chalk interment spoil, currently by the back gate, over this cleared ground and then cover it completely with topsoil.

Dave Swift will be doing this work for us over the coming months. There is still some good weather (we hope!) and time for the area to recover before the winter. Relevant planning permissions are in hand, but we cannot undertake the second phase until the area is consecrated, and for that we need the visit of a bishop!

We hope that by next year we will have the extension area ready and more usable space by the back gate. Of course it will be untidy for a time, but please bear with us as in the long term it will be much better than at present, much more attractive, and will mean that we have room for graves for many, many decades to come.
