The nice thing about getting forgetful is that you can hide your own Easter eggs.

Daily Prayer - Lord, keep your

arm around my shoulder and

your hand over my mouth.

A little question – Which of the 10 Commandments do Christians *always* break?

You will receive The Downsman just as we are thinking about Easter Eggs. We have a lot of eggs at this time of the year. An egg looks as dead and as smooth as a stone, yet we know that if the egg is fertilized, and kept warm, its hard shell will crack, and into the world will climb a fluffy yellow chick, the colour of sunshine. The egg reminds us that what looked dead and hopeless on Good Friday (when Jesus's dead body was buried) was actually full of life and hope – because Jesus broke out of the tomb to be alive forever!

And so we eat eggs. These remind us of God's love, because he was prepared to live among us, to eat with us in person, and we can 'taste and see that God is good' (Psalm 34:8).

And so, which of the 10 Commandments do Christians always break? Answer; The fourth one, 'Remember to keep holy the Sabbath.'

The Commandments were drawn up for the Jewish people and the fourth one refers to their holy day, which is of course Saturday. Jesus said he did not come to sweep away the Law, but to fulfill it. And this is one God still wants us to keep – even if on a different day. Christians, of course, keep Sunday holy, as the first day of the week and the day Jesus rose from the dead. But with so many jobs to do around the house and in the garden, it is often quite difficult for us to think of Sunday as a 'holy' day. And Sunday is also when families have the opportunity to eat a meal together and to catch up on all that is going on.

At the Last Supper, Jesus introduced us to the idea of a very special meal being the centre of the Christian family. It wasn't new, of course; he

was taking the ancient idea of the Passover meal, the celebration of God delivering his people from slavery in Egypt, and bringing it to a whole new level of meaning: A new level of freedom. And the truly amazing thing is that Jesus *shares his meal with us*. He shares his meal, his life – and his death. And the impossible happens. lesus returns to life.

It isn't the same kind of life, of course. How could it be? Death has taken him beyond ordinary human life. God's loving power has drawn him into a life that is so completely new, so completely full, that it has no limits in time or space.

In all the Gospel accounts of the Resurrection we see people who really struggle to accept that Jesus is risen. Mary Magdalene has to be told by two angels what has happened, and yet she still doesn't see Jesus when he is standing right in front of her. At other times Jesus patiently explains the scriptures or eats with his friends, but to Mary, he just calls her name... 'Mary!'

This must have been such a still moment. Just that one word hanging in the air, as the truth of the moment sinks in. Perhaps this was Mary's 'Sabbath moment' – indeed, the most holy moment of her whole life. The moment when Jesus called her name. And we can be still as well. We can listen to God as He calls our name, as we take in the most wonderful news ever.

As she runs away to tell the others, Mary must have thought that it was all too good to be true. Today, when there is so much bad news, such good news can seem too good to be true. Maybe elsewhere, if something seems too good to be true, it is.

Here, it is just good news.

IS THERE REALLY NO OTHER WAY? MEL

'Christians are so intolerant of other religions.' You can't possibly think you're the only ones who are right and everyone else is wrong.' Any one in any situation where a high value is placed on 'tolerance' can find themselves up against a barrage of criticism for having faith. So how do Christians respond to accusations of intolerance and arrogance? Can we really claim that the only way to know God is through Jesus? Where does that put us in relation to our pluralist society?

Well, we have to start with the person of Jesus, because he caused all this trouble in the first place! Jesus said 'I am the way, the truth and the life' (John 14:6). Not only that, but he also claimed that no one could come to the Father except through him. As intimidating as it might be to be accused of intolerance, is it really so offensive to claim that we have been won over by the truth – not a truth but the truth? Jesus identified himself as God. Not a part of God, or a reflection of God, but truly and fully God. He is the visible revelation of the invisible God.

Christianity is not a set of beliefs that we sign up to, and think that everyone else has to sign up to as well. It is encountering a person. There is no one else like him. Rather than focusing on a set of beliefs, we focus on the person who has won our hearts, who pours out his Spirit on us so that we can be free from all the destructive and corrupting forces of evil in the world.

Do Christians make exclusive claims? Yes. We have to, because we put our faith in the one who made them in the first place. Is this arrogant? No. After all, everyone makes exclusive claims – even those who claim they are being the most tolerant. All religions claim to be or have the ultimate way of truth. And even those who have no faith also claim to have discovered the ultimate truth – that everyone else is wrong. But this is the most arrogant thinking of all. The only position that might be considered tolerant could be extreme agnosticism: 'I'm going to leave it open that someone somewhere might be right.'

This view may be less arrogant than atheism, but is also a refusal to admit that there is such a thing as right and wrong, and that we all make decisions based on belief. Everyone believes something is true and good, and that the world would be a better place if everyone else agreed with them. This is the human condition.

I believe that Jesus came among us, not to create a group of people who thought they were right and everyone else was wrong. He came to lead us back to the God who created us in the first place. The fact that he did so while we were arrogant, proud and rebellious should only humble us deeply. We did nothing, absolutely nothing, to deserve this stooping down, this sacrifice, this death so that we could live.

The Holy Spirit works in the whole world, not just the Church. Our attitude to others should always be that we have much to learn, and God will always surprise us through those who live differently. Rowan Williams said that 'tolerance' is an awful concept. It means I can just about tolerate you. *Respect* is better. But *attention* is best.

God pays attention to us. We should reflect that in our dealings with others by giving them our attention. The truth embodied in the person of Jesus Christ places a value on every single human life. We are of infinite worth – every single one of us. The working out of Christian truth is to treat others, of whatever creed, culture or background, as they deserve – as people infinitely precious to God.
