UPDATE

A recent report, the Cocoa Barometer, has shed light on the reality of too many people harvesting cocoa beans that become the chocolate we enjoy. Despite growing global demand, many workers and smallholders still live in absolute poverty, working excessive hours in dangerous conditions. This is directly increasing the risk of the worst forms of child labour and forced adult labour.

In the last year the Stop the Traffick campaign has influenced four major chocolate companies to announce moves to tackle trafficking. Nestles, Mars, Hershey and Mondelez have all made public commitments to certify their cocoa beans or release a certified chocolate bar. Cadbury's already has a few bars with the fair-trade logo. Please look out for this, as well as the Rain Forrest Alliance logo, when you buy chocolate. It may be no different in taste, but you will know you are helping someone get a better life, rather than supporting the oppression of plantation workers. It will not leave a nasty taste in your mouth.

Even if you haven't got a computer, I'm sure you've heard about 'social networking.' Half the population of the UK is now on Facebook and/or Twitter. Since the first tweet on March21st 2006, social media websites has changed the way the world communicates - frequently and in short bursts. Sites like Twitter are the modern way for many to spread information and share experiences.

God's social network is not confined to Twitter or Facebook. For instance, Paul is prompted not by a Tweet but by a dream (Acts 16:9-15). Dreams have been around a long time, but don't underestimate their power - modern research shows that the brain is doing very important things while we dream. They are rebooting, and in doing so may just be returning to factory settings - Getting in touch with their Maker, in fact! (You might remember a very significant dream you had at some point in your life. You have to use a lot of common sense, of course, but maybe, just maybe, a dream can be God's way of telling you something very special.)

Food. It's part of our daily lives. It's on our TV screens and our kitchen tables. An endless stream of meal deals and fast-food chains. Yet one in eight people go to bed hungry every night. That is nearly a billion people around the world - more than the population of Europe, North America and Australia combined. Even in the UK, we are seeing a rise in the need for food banks.

And the shocking truth is that there is enough food in the world to feed everyone. The rising costs of food, changes in climate, tax avoidance, companies taking land from farmers and many other factors mean that we keep seeing hunger crises in some of the poorest communities in the world, while other parts of the world tackle obesity, overconsumption and incredible amounts of waste. Where is the justice in this inequality?

A world in which everyone has access to enough food is possible. In 2013 over 100 charities and churches have launched the biggest UK anti-poverty campaign since Make Poverty History. Enough Food for Everyone IF is a coalition of organisations that sees 2013 as a crucial year to ask world leaders to fix the world's broken food system and to remove the 'ifs' that make it so fragile and ineffective.

We can all speak out against the injustice of hunger and be the voice of the voiceless. No one need be hungry or malnourished. Getting enough of the right food gives people a future. Churches all over the country are joining together to shout loud enough for our world leaders to hear and make decisions that could bring justice to the millions all over the world going hungry. We need to be part of a social revolution that sees people make lifestyle changes in a world of increasing population and finite resources, ensuring that all who are made in the image of God are treated equally.

This is what God intends his Earth to look like. We all know the story of the feeding of the five thousand. Jesus performed a miracle that saw five loaves and two fish stretch to feed more than it ought. It looked like there wasn't going to be enough, but there was more than enough. Jesus did not give any more to one person than he did another and yet 'all were satisfied.' What a wonderful image of equality.

This is a chance to bring about the image we read in the Bible, the image of everyone having enough. The Church isn't just a holy huddle. We are one body making a stand for our brothers and sisters around the world who need us to fight for their survival. We can take action and work towards a world of enough loaves and fish for everyone - God's kingdom come.



The IF campaign focuses on some of the root causes of hunger and poverty. Our government needs to keep its promise to give 0.7% of GDP as aid and, with other rich countries, provide the additional

money to help poor countries adapt to climate change. Companies and governments need to stop grabbing land from poor communities who can't prove they own it. We need to change the EU biofuel target that makes such land grabs profitable and pushes up food prices. Companies need to stop tax dodging, so they pay tax in poor countries where they operate, and the governments of those countries need to be more accountable to their people for how they use their budgets. Finally, multinational food companies need to be more accountable for their food stocks and food prices.


