I heard the other day that the cutbacks are going to affect some of our favourite Christmas songs this year. For instance, The 12 Days of Christmas has to be cut back to The 6 Days of Christmas. And there can definitely only be two French hens...We shall only be able to Deck the Hall, and there will only be Frosty, the Snowflake. Sorry.

But we can still sing. Singing is good for you. It is an aerobic activity that increases oxygenation in the blood and exercises major muscle groups. It also reduces stress levels through the action of the endocrine system, which is linked to our sense of emotional well-being. (I have to admit I didn't know that.) It also releases the endorphin oxytocin - in fact the equivalent amount of oxytocin as a bar of chocolate or a mince pie. All this from singing!

I'll let you in on a secret - God likes a nice bit of singing! The Bible says God rejoices over his children with singing. And there's more. The word 'carol' comes from the French word 'caroler'. which means, not to sing, but to dance. And dancing, of course, is very healthy exercise. It just gets better!

Jesus said that the Kingdom is for those prepared to become like children. He doesn't mean being childish, he means being open to new ideas, open to celebrating love and life. And the first Christmas was a truly awesome party! Angels turned up in their droves lighting up the sky. Wise Men brought presents. And even the lowliest, poorest people were invited. Everyone could come. After all, it was God's Party!

And we can have a party at home as well. Why not fill up wine glasses with different levels of water and see if you can get a tune going? And you might like to stop the neighbours complaining about the noise by inviting then in for a glass of something (perhaps not water) and a carol karaoke.

Let's fill the neighbourhood with the sound of singing as we celebrate the biggest birthday party. After all, we are lowering our blood pressure, strengthening our muscles, improving our sense of well-being, bonding with our neighbours, celebrating Jesus and worshipping God. To you who bring small children to church...

There you are sitting in church. Your child is restless. You try to quieten them. Nothing. You try to pacify them with food. You go to the children's corner. Nothing. Eventually, you resort to the last thing you wanted to do. You pick them up and, feeling everyone's eyes on you, march out of the building. You are embarrassed and frustrated. You think to yourself, "There's no point in coming to church. I get nothing out of it."

I want you to know there is a point and just how encouraging you are to many. The little lady who often feels alone, beams at the sight of you wrestling with your little one. She's been there herself. She knows how hard it can be, and she smiles because it brings back precious memories. To see young parents and their small children brightens her day.

The elderly man who always seems to be grouchy notices you too. He seems to be always talking about how children these days have no respect. But he sees you, and you give him hope that maybe the church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who bring their children to worship.

The couple unable to have children notices you too. They'd love to be in your shoes. They'd love to talk to you for a little while about the joys of your children. They need you. Then there's everybody else. Some of them will be frustrated by noisy children in church. They have this idea that reverence is the same as absolute silence. It isn't.

When parents brought their children to Jesus, the disciples rebuked them (Matt. 19.13-15). But Jesus rebuked his disciples. He said, "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." The term translated "children" in Matthew and Mark's Gospels is paidon. The word paediatric comes from this: it means infants or children, boys or girls. When Luke wrote his account, he used the word brephos, which means infants. Luke wasn't contra-

dicting Matthew and Mark, as he wrote that they brought infants 'also' (Luke 18.15-17).

Think about it. The children would have squirmed, perhaps cried. This was probably why the disciples rebuked the parents. They may also have thought the children were too young to understand the

blessing Jesus was giving them.

Bring your children to church. If you don't hear crying, the church is dying. As hard as it might be for you as a parent who's half-asleep on a Sunday morning, take courage. You are an encouragement, and you are starting your children's lives in the right way.


GET CHRISTENED IN CHURCH!

Thank God for the gift of life, give that life the best start possible, and get the support of millions of Christians across the whole world! Christening and baptism are different words for the same thing. For your child, baptism marks the start of a journey of faith, turning towards Jesus and becoming a member of the worldwide Christian family.

You are only baptized once and can happen at any age. What matters is that those concerned are committed to bring up the child as a Christian. Teenagers and adults can also be baptized, making the choice for themselves. This is usually accompanied with Confirmation.

The Church believes that God's love is available to all, so even if you are not a regular churchgoer you can still have a baptism. However, you might prefer to have a Thanksgiving Service, thanking God for the gift of your child. You do not make the same promises, and you may also have a Baptism service at a later date. Thanksgivings and baptisms usually take place within the church's main service, as it is important that the congregation supports and welcomes you. However, if circumstances make this difficult, talk the vicar.


Baptism, like God's love, is free. You may wish to find out more about the Christian faith before you make a decision. Talk to the vicar today or look at the Church of England website.

Thank you to all those who have supported the Trussell Trust during the past year. The need for food has doubled during the year, however our giving was well down. It would be very much appreciated by those who have empty cupboards if everyone could give one extra item per month. Many mothers go without food for days on end in order to feed their children on the little they have, and it has been known for them to beg from a neighbour in order to do this.

Food weight for 1st November 2012 - 31st October 2013 was 303.7kg. This amounted to 757 items. (The previous year was 408.5kg) We did not count the items in 2011/2012. 108 Shoeboxes were filled and will be shortly on their way to Bulgaria. They are so much appreciated by all who receive them. If you would like to fill one next year, it is a good time after Christmas to start collecting things like woolly hats, scarves & gloves in the Winter Sales!
