
## **Waistcoat Festival**

Who would have thought that a wet Sunday afternoon would be the start of something great? Two years ago we invited the families of babies baptised at Sixpenny Handley and Pentridge to a Teddy Bears' Picnic. Suitably tiny sandwiches and cakes were prepared, helpers were ready to look after the children and their parents, and I was looking forward to reading a story. But it rained, and rained. And rained. Thinking nobody would venture out on such a day, only a few cups and saucers were put out, and the urn only half filled. But they came. Conversations showed a real need to get out, particularly in such weather, and an idea was born – a 'Teddy Bear Drop-In'.

Now, every Thursday morning during term time, St Mary's buzzes with activity. Bright mats and toys welcome the children and their carers, and there is a constant flow of squash and biscuits for the children, and coffee and biscuits for the adults. The group is organised by Jean Mayne, 'Granny Jean' to all the children. She is helped each week by other Lay Pastoral Assistants. (LPAs are trained and licensed through the church to help in pastoral matters). They play with the children, chat with the parents, and keep

everyone topped up with refreshments. It is a delight to see the children develop, and the parents form supportive friendships. Good times and difficult times are shared, I usually get to read a story (which I enjoy as much as the children) and there is much laughter.

Two years on and a second generation is coming through - brothers and sisters, and new families who have heard that this is a good place to be. We are holding our second Teddy Bear Drop-In Anniversary Service on Sunday May 25th at 11am do come along. Last year, most people sat on the floor for a very informal and happy service, which included birthday cake and blowing bubbles, followed by (yes, you've guessed) squash and biscuits! (Don't worry, some people sat on the pews as well!)

We are also celebrating parents. After our Mothering Sunday service last month, we are celebrating Fathering Sunday, on June 15th (Fathers' Day) beginning at 10am. After all, we can all show fathering love as well as mothering love! Come along and celebrate with us.



## FOLLOW THE PARADE

The little boy lived in a small country town where there had never been a circus. He knew about circuses from his schoolbooks, but he had never seen a real one. One

day he saw a poster on the side of a building announcing that a circus was coming to his town. Well, he knew right away that he must see that circus, so he began to save up for it, and he started counting the days. On the night before the great event he was too excited to sleep. He was up before dawn to on the High Street by nine o'clock.



Soon afterwards, the great circus parade came along. He saw lions and tigers, beautiful horses, tremendous elephants, jugglers, clowns, acrobats, and the circus band. His eyes were wide with excitement, his feet couldn't stop jumping up and down, and he couldn't stop shouting.

When the parade finally ended, the little boy stepped out of the crowd, handed his money to the last man in the parade, and went back home. He thought to himself that the circus was just about the greatest thing he had ever seen. It was not until years later that he discovered he had still not seen a circus. He had only watched the parade and gone home. He saw the parade but missed the circus.

As the crowds saw Jesus ride into town on what we now call Palm Sunday, I wonder if they realised what was going on. Did they see more than just a man riding on a

donkey? Did they see Jesus as the Son of God or did they miss it? And what of us? Do we just see the parade and miss the circus? Do we see the hot cross buns and the chocolate eggs, but miss the Son of God?

There was once a stable boy who listened carefully to the story of Palm Sunday. After hearing it, he said, Jesus must have had wonderful hands. If Jesus could sit on an untried, unbroken animal, if he could soothe it and control it and

guide it while people were shouting, waving branches and throwing down clothes, Jesus must have had wonderful hands!

The hands of Christ are indeed wonderful hands. They reach out to people from every walk of life. They touch the sick and dying, raise the dead, feed a hungry crowd and calm a storm. They allow Jesus to ride into Jerusalem and face the cross. What matters is that they are His hands. The hands of God reaching to us. Reaching to everyone. Saving the world.

He knew that the parade was going to end with his death. But death is not the end of the story. Come to church this Easter and explore what this means, and what it means for you.


