## Dear Friends

A five year-old little girl was watching as the nativity scene was set up for the carol service. She was mesmerised by all the figures, and especially by the baby Jesus. When she asked what the manger was, her teacher explained it was a feeding trough and that Mary and Joseph didn't have a crib or a cot, so they had to put a blanket on the hay in the trough and lay the baby Jesus there.

The little girl thought for a moment and then asked, 'Did they have to use a manger for his car seat, too?'

We might not always get all the details right, but Christmas is a very special time. We remember a baby in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village where he worked in his step-father's woodwork shop until he was thirty. Then for three years he walked around the area as an itinerant preacher. He never wrote a book. He never held office. He never had a family or owned a house. He never travelled more than 200 miles from the place he grew up. He did none of the things we usually associate with greatness. He had no credentials except himself.

He was only thirty-three when the tide of public opinion turned against him. His friends ran away and he was executed by being nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying his executioners gambled for his clothing, the only property he had on earth.

Two thousand years have come and gone and today this man is still the central figure of the human race. All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, all the kings that ruled or presidents that were elected, all put together, have not affected our lives on this earth as much as that one solitary life.


The baby, born in a dirty stable, changed everything for ever. He is sometimes called 'The Light of the World', (you may know the famous painting of that name) which seems particularly appropriate at this time of year as we light candles and think of that great star and those shining angels.

We all experience dark times in our lives. We all go through bad experiences. But it only takes one little light to push the darkness away. It might still be gloomy, but it is no longer dark. And we also know that, two thousand years ago, God punched a hole in the darkness so that the light would shine through for all time and we need never walk in darkness again. This is what we celebrate at Christmas. This is the Good News.

And as part of that Good News we give and receive presents. In this edition of The Seeker we are thinking about gifts and talents, and I hope that you enjoy the season. The whole of Christmas, indeed the whole of history, is incomprehensible without Jesus. And remember, at Christmas time we often receive presents we don't really need. God offers us a gift we cannot do without.



Why not join us for the real Christmas this Christmas time?





At Harvest we launched our most bizarre fund-raising scheme yet. We gave away money! We gave away envelopes containing crisp £10 notes. And we still have some more to give away! This is a starter kit as part of our Talent Challenge. The challenge is to use this money to generate more money before Easter 2009, when we ask for the £10 back and your profit to go towards the planned improvements (see We've got talent right).

The money being given away has been lent by members of the church. You might think about using it to grow and sell plants, take in ironing, sell cakes, hold a Scrabble evening, show your holiday pictures over a meal, sell things on ebay, hold a clothes swap, tutor music or maths, sell real lemonade, walk dogs. We are now over half way to raising the funds we need, and the planned improvements at St Mary's, Sixpenny Handley are going on apace. Plans will soon be appearing in the church and we hope to get a lot of the work done next year. Please come up and have a look. Many people have already been very helpful and put in

a lot of work on this project and the experts from the diocese have been uniformly supportive and encouraging. I would particularly like to thank Sheila Bradley, Margaret Durrant and Gillian Wadge for all their work, and there are many others who are giving generously of their time.

The bells and the clock need important maintenance, and we would like to move the font forward into the body of the church where it can be seen more and be easier to use. Around this we would like to create a better space for coffee and other social events at the back of the church and put a toilet in a (soundproofed!) cabin in the base of the tower. We are also

looking at improving the heating and the sound and vision systems, and improving the kitchen facilities. The path outside needs attention, and the final job would be a general redecoration. We believe that the church and the community as a whole will benefit greatly from the improvements and the building will actually look like less has been done to it than before as the proposals are in keeping with our heritage, while bringing our beautiful building up to date.

### WEVEGOTTALENT! Mel Durrant

The Parable of the Talents, Matthew's Gospel, Chapter 25. The story Jesus tells about the people given talents and then told to go away and use them to their best ability is one of those stories... SO famous! I first heard it when I was very little, but one thing that puzzled me is the amount of talents that are given away. The servants are given five, two and one talent apiece. Different amounts - and yet not one of them says that it is unfair.

I thought it sounded very unfair. I may only have had one brother, and no servants, but we knew exactly how to share things fairly. When there was cake or pudding left over, we followed the 'one cuts the other chooses' way of sharing. Everything was divided up, equally, to the nearest molecule. I can still divide any shape exactly in half to this day — it's a very useful skill!

So in this story, when the three people are given such obviously different amounts, I felt for the one given less. And I also didn't like the reaction of the King when he becomes so angry on his return and found that the man had buried his one talent rather than risk using it to generate more. There is something very unfair going on here, I thought.

But then, I have learnt since that life is very unfair. Let me explain... The problem lies with the word 'talent'. This skews the way we read the story, because immediately we think of our talent in playing the piano, or singing, or gardening, or whatever talent we may have. Jesus is not talking about these sorts of talents. 'Talent,' in this story, is an ingot of gold or silver or copper. The most common was made of silver and in today's money would sell for over £2,000.

That sounds quite a lot already – we could do with quite a few talents like that in our Talent Challenge for St Mary's. And when you remember that a day's wage at the time was only one penny, I reckon that to repay a talent would take 200,000 days' wages. Even if you worked every day (except the Sabbath, of course) and put all the money you earned into repaying just one talent, you would take about 639 years to repay the loan.

Once we know the size of a 'talent', my original objection begins to be put into perspective. The whole point is that they have been given something beyond price.

Hold on! A loan you cannot possibly repay? Jesus is telling a story of our time! We hear a lot about loans from banks that cannot be repaid.

But this story might also set us thinking about what is it that God gives us that is so completely unrepayable...

This is what is unfair. We have all been given something so valuable that we cannot possibly repay it. We have been given life. All we can do is use it. This is why LIFE is unfair. We have each been given infinitely precious life and a

world to live it in. Both are just staggeringly wonderful. And we have been given them. We have been allowed to do what we will with them.

At Christmas we remember the first time Jesus came to us, and one day he will come back to see how we have been getting on. What will he find? What will his reaction be? We have been trusted to do something with our lives and not just bury them or waste them. Don't compare your life with the person next to you – Each life is completely unique. Do something good with yours.

The old lady had always had a strange attitude to gifts. If she was given a gift she would thank the person profusely and say how kind it was of them. Then, without unwrapping it, she would put it away in a drawer. 'For later' she said. When a niece came to help her move, she discovered many unused gifts, still in that drawer and still wrapped. There were cakes and nice biscuits that had moulded away. There were jars of fine things long past their use-by date. There were clothes that she would no longer fit into. Drawer after drawer of

gifts were put in the bin.

Because she did not use them, she lost them. She never had the benefit of them.

We must use wisely, and enjoy all that God gives us. Have a wonderful Christmas.
