Dear Friends

Surprisingly, when we know that we live in a global village and everybody depends on everybody else, we still hear the old proverb 'Charity begins at home.' Now, I am quite happy for charity to begin at home, but people often mean that it ends at home as well.

We face challenging times ahead, politically and financially, but I really believe that God means us to look out for each other, not just for ourselves. And he means us to give. On the one hand, giving is good for

us. It stops us being selfish or greedy and helps us to be aware of how much we already have. And on the other hand, we are meant to see anyone in need as our neighbour. Everyone is our neighbour. Remember why Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan!

We are all brothers and sisters. There are no boundaries. This means two things. We need to support Christians wherever they may be. We can give our prayers, our time and our resources to those who have less than ourselves. And they give us their prayers and wisdom in return. It does not matter where 'they' are. And we need to support each other, whatever our faith or place in life. This is our mission.

And as part of our mission we hope to be able to use the church building in Sixpenny Handley as a resource more often. One way we are trying to do this is starting a 'drop-in' with teas and coffees on Saturday afternoons. We are aware that many people come as tourists or to tend graves. They come and they go. Now we can provide a drink (and a toilet!) and, if people want, a listening ear. In the church. This time will be open to anyone who wants to come, visitor or resident, of course.

I first mentioned this at the Parish Meeting in April and I know some people have been concerned that this would be in competition with refreshments at the Post Office. This was never our intention, and we have decided that we shall begin by being available in the afternoon, when the Post Office is closed. Of course all our churches are open all the time and the vicarage is available all the time. But if there is anything you would like to talk about, in confidence and over a cup of tea, please come along to St Mary's on Saturday afternoon from about 2.30pm from the beginning of June. Paul or I hope to be there most weeks, and there will always be someone there trained to listen. We will see how it goes.

I am also looking at having a monthly 'drop-in' in the Post Office Coffee Shop once a month. This will be on the first Wednesday unless otherwise advertised. If you would like to talk about a christening, wedding or funeral, or there is anything I may be able to help you with, please come along for a coffee and a chat then. Or simply give me a ring at the vicarage!

Our mission is to bring life and love to our needy world, wherever it is wanting. We welcome people and love them simply because we know that God loves them

too. We give of ourselves in mission, but we know that it is always God's work first, and our work second. But together we can make a difference! We have an amazing message of good news in the love of Jesus. We live in a wonderful community and worship in beautiful buildings. Let's tell people about this! And let us pray this little prayer I was given by a neighbouring vicar;

I'm only one, but I am one. I can't do everything, but I can do something. What I ought to do, I can do. And what I can do, by the grace of God I will do.

This was set up by the charity that used to be known as the National Children's Homes. Then in July we shall give £200 to Wheels for the World

(www.throughtheroof.org) which is the overseas programme of Through the Roof, restoring and distributing old NHS wheelchairs, mostly to people in Africa. The chairs are restored in a workshop in HMP Parkhurst and then sent out with volunteer physiotherapists, occupational therapists and wheelchair technicians working in partnership with Christian organisations abroad.

The Way Ahead

I don't know where the time has gone! Margaret and I have lived here for three years now. It all still feels very new, but at the same time we cannot really remember living anywhere else. Thank you for making us so welcome.

We have been thinking about our role in our villages, and in 2008 we laid out the vision focussed on what is one of our biggest resources; our beautiful buildings. At the Annual Meeting last year I thanked everyone who had worked very hard on the plans and the fundraising. And this year I want to thank a lot of people: our Project Managers and builders, the PCCs, the service leaders, the church wardens, musicians and choir, the churchyard teams, cleaners and flower arrangers, the LPAs and those who help with the groups. And I need to thank some individuals by name (I know this is a very dangerous thing to do!); Graham Smith for his fundraising with Sheila's Quilt, which raised its £2,000 target; Mike Dyer for the Signals Band Concert, Bobby Carter and Jean Mayne for all their work, including the Christmas Fayre; and many more, too many to name, who have helped with so much. There is so much going on! We are moving forward. We can give thanks.

As far as the buildings are concerned we have to balance the fact that they serves the living Church, with the fact that we worship in very beautiful parts of our heritage that hold very special places in a lot of people's hearts. This is why we have worked so hard on the 50K Challenge and we have consulted with the experts at every stage of our journey. At Gussage St Andrew we are conserving the medieval wall paintings for future generations to enjoy and rethinking the antiguated electricity supply. At St Mary's the work at the back of the tower and nave is complete, giving us much needed meeting space as well as a toilet for our many visitors. At both St Mary's and St Rumbold's the living churchyard scheme means that the churchyards are full of rare plants, insects and birds. These, too, attract visitors.

We still have work to do, of course. At St Mary's the heating and sound systems need renewing (please talk to us if you would like to help). But there is a lot to be thankful for. We are going places.

But too often the world treats 'church' as a leisure industry. We are a community and a community with a mission.

I know 'mission' can be a bit of a scary word at times. But mission is telling people about something good. It is about sharing friendship and community and the love of God. It is about people seeing us having something special and wanting that something for themselves. Mission is not what just church leaders do. It is something we all do. We cannot separate our worship, beliefs, pastoral and social concerns, practical and financial issues. They are all mission and come as a package.

And it is a package called life life in all its fullness. Life everlasting. And our vision is not complete until we turn our prayers and talking and worship into action. This is our challenge.

Mission is being with other people and bringing them to a better place. To Jesus. Just think - if we all just brought one person to church (to 'Back to Church Sunday' in September for instance, but any Sunday) and they stayed, in a few years we would need to extend the building. And the world would be a better place. And God would smile.

So I ask you to think and pray about how we can serve our community and share the Good News of Jesus Christ. We have done a lot in a comparatively short time and we are on a mission. Thank you. There is more. And I really believe God has more exciting plans for His Church in this place. Mel Durrant
