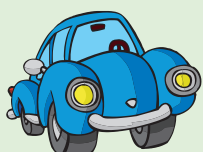

But with so many jobs to do around the house and garden at this time of year, it is often quite difficult to think of Sunday as a 'holy' day. However, we need to remember what Sunday is intended to be about. It might not be the original 'Sabbath', but God still wants us to keep some special time, a 'Sabbath Moment' when we can focus on Him away from all the stresses and strains of all the other days.

And Sunday is also, traditionally, a family day, when families have the opportunity to be together, to eat together and to catch up on all that is going on. All through history, sharing a meal has been seen as a very significant event. 'Going out for a meal' is still one of the most accepted ways of celebrating something special, such as an anniversary or a birthday. Think of weddings and christenings, birthday parties and so on – they all involve eating together. In almost all societies everywhere, sharing a meal together denotes relationship, special bonds of friendship. As members of God's family we meet for some Sabbath time together on Sunday. Together we listen to God's Word and share his table, as a family

At the Last Supper, Jesus introduced us to the idea of a very special meal being the focus, the centre of worship for Christians. It wasn't completely new; he was taking the ancient idea of the Passover meal, the celebration of God delivering his people from slavery in Egypt into freedom in the

Promised Land – taking that and bringing it to a whole new level of meaning: A new level of freedom. And the truly amazing part of the celebration is that Jesus *shares his meal with us*. He shares his meal, and his life in this 'Sabbath Moment.'

The Queen has anointed sovereign sixty years ago. I'm sure this was her 'Sabbath Moment.' Indeed, it was considered too special, too *holy* to be filmed at the time. She says little in public about her faith, but what she does say – usually at the end of her Christmas Day broadcast – is powerful in its directness. Having discussed the celebrations, tragedies and anxieties of the past year, the Queen affirms, naturally but unflinchingly, her faith in Jesus Christ. In her message last Christmas, she said, *'although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us that we sometimes need saving from ourselves – from our recklessness or our greed.'*

'God sent into the world a unique person – neither a philosopher nor a general, important though they are, but a Saviour, with the power to forgive. Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love.'

And we can all have our own 'Sabbath Moment'. When we choose to be still and listen to God, and accept his love and forgiveness. It is completely extraordinary and yet also completely *natural* that Jesus calls each one of us, commoner, citizen and royalty, to be with him in the power of God's love.

Teddy Bear drop in!

Our term time drop-in for preschool children and their carers has got off to a good start, meeting in St Mary's from 9.30am on Thursday.

The Queen is the second longest serving monarch in our history. She was born on 21st April, 1926, and christened on 29th May, 1926 in the Private Chapel at Buckingham Palace. She was confirmed on 28th March, 1942 in the Private Chapel at Windsor Castle and came to the throne in 1952. Only five other kings and queens in British history have reigned for 50

years or more. They are: Victoria (63 years), George III (59 years), Henry III (56 years), Edward III (50 years) and James VI of Scotland (James I of England) (58 years).

The Queen is the fortieth monarch since William the Conqueror. During her reign there have been six Archbishops of Canterbury: Geoffrey Fisher, Michael Ramsey, Donald Coggan, Robert Runcie, George Carey and Rowan Williams. There have also been six Popes: Pius XII, John XXIII, Paul VI, John Paul I, John Paul II, and Benedict XVI. Over the last sixty years The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh have sent some 45,000 Christmas cards.

If you look at any coin with the Queen's portrait you will see round her head 'ELIZABETH II D.G. REG. F.D.' This is short for 'Elizabeth II Dei Gratia Regina Fidei Defensor', which is Latin for 'Elizabeth II, by the Grace of God, Queen, Defender of the Faith'.

As 'Defender of the Faith' the Queen has a specific role in the United Kingdom in both the Church of England and the Church of Scotland. As established Churches, they are recognised by law as the official Churches of England and Scotland. The Church of England, and the monarch's relation to it, was established through a series of Parliamentary Acts in the 1530s, which brought about the English Reformation. In both England and Scotland,

they are subject to the regulation of law and the principle of religious toleration is fully recognized - both for those of other creeds and for those of none. (The Church in Wales was disestablished in 1920, and in Northern Ireland in 1869).

As a country we are in the privileged position of having a monarch who has a deep personal faith. The Queen has said, 'I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel.'

At her Golden Jubilee, she said, 'I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God.'

In another broadcast she said, 'Even in our very material age the impact of Christ's life is all around us. If you want to see an expression of Christian faith you have only to look at our awe-inspiring cathedrals and abbeys, listen to their music, or look at their stained glass windows, their books and their pictures. But the true measure of Christ's influence is not only in the lives of the saints but also in the good works quietly done by millions of men and women day in and day out throughout the centuries.'

'Many will have been inspired by Jesus' simple but powerful teaching: love God and love thy neighbour as thyself - in other words, treat others as you would like them to treat you. His great emphasis was to give spirituality a practical purpose.'

'To many of us our beliefs are of fundamental importance. For me the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life. I, like so many of you, have drawn great comfort in difficult times from Christ's words and example.'
