Red Remembrance

The red poppy is worn by millions of people every year. The British Legion website reminds us what the red poppy is, and, very importantly, what it is *not*. It is *not* a symbol of death, or a sign of support for war. It is *not* any reflection or support of political or religious beliefs. It is *not* red to reflect the colour of blood. No, poppies are red because that is their natural colour, and they are the first thing to grow and flower when land is disturbed. Poppies are worn by millions of people coming together, as a symbol of remembrance and hope.

It is the stories of individual people that make history come alive. For instance, Albert Penn, newly married to Florence and living in a village near Chesterfield. Keen Sunday School teachers, their lives focused around their little chapel and their home.

In 1916, Albert volunteered. At first he was refused because his wife was pregnant, and he was told to return when the baby was 3 months old. He did, and 8 months after that, when baby Mary Estelle was just 11 months old, Albert was dead.

He died as Passchendaele on 30th October 1917, just 29 years old. His body was never found – the last recorded sighting of Albert was of him standing in an open field, with his Bible in his hand. Soon after this, the regiment went over the top. Florence was a widow at the age of 23.

Their granddaughter, Cynthia Hardiman, said *'in that situation, in war, he was still preaching. He was still encouraging young fellas and trying to keep up morale. I like to think that in that terrible time, he didn't keep the faith. The faith kept him.'*

At this time of year we give remember and thanks for people like Albert. His name does not sound as old-fashioned as it used to; names like his are back in fashion. Perhaps this can prompt us to keep praying and working for peace in our own time, in so many places in our troubled world, both near and far.

This year we come together to remember those who have suffered in war and conflict at our services at the War Memorial in Sixpenny Handley on Friday 11th November and in St Mary's and St Rumbold's on Remembrance Sunday 13th November. Please join us.

Dear friends...

Have you ever heard something so ridiculous that you find yourself exclaiming ‘Oh come on!’? Sometimes the world is just so ridiculous. For instance, I read the other day about someone being arrested for ‘stealing electricity’ from a train company by plugging his phone in on the train. Then he was de-arrested, because it was so ridiculous, and then he was re-arrested because of some ‘inappropriate behaviour’ related to the original arrest. ‘Oh come on!’

For some people, the most ridiculous thing they have ever heard is that God loves them and sent his Son for them, died and rose again for them, and wants to know them as a friend... ‘Oh come on!’

Psalms 67 says, *The land yields its harvest; God, our God, blesses us.* At this time of year we celebrate the harvest, and we are very aware of change. The turn of the seasons brings changing colours of the leaves and changing patterns in our lives. For farmers this means bringing the dairy herd in, getting the ewes in good condition before they go to the ram, bringing the sheep down off the hills, drilling the winter wheat, and all this before the heavy rains come. And so the farmer’s work goes steadily on, season after season.

Autumn is all about mists. It is the famous *season of mists and mellow fruitfulness*, (which sounds much better than ‘damp and dull’!). Mist and fruit go together at this time of year, like apple and blackberry – and I think they can be found together in our spiritual lives as well. So I wonder what ‘season’ you find yourself in at the moment. There is no right or wrong answer.

Perhaps it feels like *winter*, when the soil of your faith is cold and there is little sign of anything that might bear fruit. Or do you feel like it is *spring*, and your life sees signs of growth? Or do you feel like you live in warm *summer* days? Or have we come full circle and you are living in the *autumnal* mists again? You know there is much to give

thanks for, but your inner questions seem unanswered and the way ahead is unclear.

The seasons of our lives are constantly changing, and we need wisdom to recognize the gifts, challenges and opportunities of each one. Perhaps God gives us earthly seasons to remind us of the things that really matter, and to push us to explore further and further into the reality of His love for us.

There is an old hymn that goes,

*Through all the changing scenes
of life, in trouble and in joy,
The praises of my God shall still
my heart and tongue employ.*

So perhaps the problem is how we look at things. We usually say, ‘Oh come on!’ in a negative way. But think about how powerful it becomes if we use it as a request, an invitation, a prayer to the living breathing God to enter a situation – our situation, ‘Oh come on, Holy Spirit, come!’

Let’s give thanks for what we have: God gives us an amazing world. And we can think about those who have less than we do, and ask for God to move in our lives, in their lives, and in his world, to make it and us the people we should be. This is a journey that starts right here and right now, *for the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.* Amen.

The Spirit of God moves where it will. Even the water will not stay on the plate but will, in its own time, evaporate and rise invisibly into the air.
What comes to mind when you consider frozenness, melting, movement, rising, air?
Offer your reflection to God and listen to what God might say in response.
The next time you see frost on the grass or ice in a drink, remember your prayer and offer a new one.
