

DIARY OF A COUNTRY PARSON

As 2021 draws to a close many of us will be thinking of what 2022 will have in store for us. The roaring twenties haven't got off to the start many of us imagined or hoped for. The COVID Pandemic has controlled our lives in ways that we couldn't have conceived three years ago.

However, life and human resilience always amazes me at its ability to adapt even in the most difficult of circumstances. I write this article on Armistice Day which is a sombre reminder of both the worst and best of humanity. This remembering over the years has helped us learn that it's not victory we celebrate but human courage, dignity, and compassion. It also helps us to understand that evil is ever present in our world and to recognise it when we see it particularly when peoples are oppressed because of colour, creed, or sexuality. In similar words St Paul reminds us "There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28. We are all quite simply God's children and more than

anything he wishes us to live in peace and harmony.

In a few weeks we will celebrate that great festival of peace and hope. As the Angels sang on Christmas Day and as we will in our carol singing "All glory in the highest, Peace on earth, goodwill to men, Glory in the highest." The nativity is a reminder to us that God does things differently. The creator of the universe who flung stars into space doesn't come in might and power but as a helpless babe to a family of refuges fleeing persecution by a despot king and occupying forces. The life of Jesus is a model for us all on how to live. Jesus enjoyed life and celebrated it with his friends. His first miracle was turning 120 gallons of water into wine! He enjoyed being with people from all walks of life and backgrounds. He taught love compassion and mercy, wept at the death or his friends and for what he could see society was becoming. Then when faced with persecution and death he did not revile or threaten by prayed and loved. It was

this way of living that defeated the powers of evil when he burst from the tomb on the first Easter morning.

Many of us might not consider ourselves religious or churchy people. We may also feel that organised religion in its many forms has a lot to answer, I do too. However, many of us acknowledge a spiritual dimension to life and of all the world's greatest teachers it's hard to argue with the teaching of Jesus. "Love one another as I have love you" or "do unto others as you would have done to yourself" If we try to live our lives following this simple but powerful teaching, we will become better people and build better communities.

I have no idea what 2022 will bring but I know it will probably be a mix of good and bad. What I need to do is ensure I'm engaging in the good and when faced with the bad I look to the example of the child of Bethlehem.
